Fighting Classroom Censorship

Over the last two years, we have seen an increase in censorship legislation across the nation. Georgia is not an exception. These bills target historically marginalized groups, students of color and LGBTQ+ students, by removing literature and curricula that reflects and affirms their lived experiences.



Currently, there are five bills filed with the Georgia State
Legislature that seek to censor classrooms and limit the educational freedom all children
are entitled to. Four of those bills specifically apply to classroom materials: HB88,
HB1084, SB375, and SB377. See our comparative analysis of these bills and their

Georgia's students deserve the right to a diverse education that not only equips them for an increasingly diverse world, but also uplifts and affirms the lived experiences of those students who have been historically marginalized. The Georgia legislature will hear bills that would violate that right by censoring educators and classrooms across the state from discussing the realities of systemic racism and oppression in the United States.
